IV. Assignments

Written assignments should be turned in together at the close of a course.

1. Read *An Introduction to the New Testament* in its entirety.

2. Watch/Listen to all of the lectures.

3. Write a two-page double spaced reflection paper on chapter two (pp. 77-127).

A reflection paper identifies the subject(s) under consideration and gives a summarization of your reaction to the material with evidence from the material to support your suppositions. Reflection papers answer the questions “Did you agree with the claims of the author?,” “What did you learn?,” “What misconceptions did you have that the author helped you correct?” Footnote all citations. 4. Write a two-page double spaced reflection paper on chapter nine (pp. 354-85).

5. Write a six to eight-page double-spaced research paper on the motif of kingship as it appears in the gospels. Focus specifically upon the motif as it relates to Jesus in terms of the inauguration, continuation, and consummation of the kingdom of God. This paper should include at least five written works aside from *An Introduction to the New Testament* and the lectures. Footnote all citations and provide both a cover page and a works cited page. Consult either the *Chicago Manual of Style* or Turabian for questions of citation and pagination.
