IV. Assignments

Written assignments should be turned in together at the close of a course.

- 1. Complete the assigned reading.
- 2. Listen/watch to the assigned lectures.
- 3. Write a two-page double spaced reflection paper the life of C. H. Spurgeon. A reflection paper identifies the subject(s) under consideration and gives a summarization of your reaction to the material with evidence from the material to support your suppositions. Reflection papers answer the questions "Did you agree with the claims of the author?," "What did you learn?," "What misconceptions did you have that the author helped you correct?" - 4. Write a two-page double spaced reflection paper on any other topic in either the lectures or reading.
- 5. Write a five to eight-page double-spaced research paper that builds upon Spurgeon's argumentation against baptismal regeneration. Utilize at least five written works aside from the assigned reading. Footnote all citations and provide both a



cover page and a works cited page. Consult either the *Chicago Manual of Style* or Turabian for questions of citation and pagination.
