- 1. Read both textbooks in their entirety.**
- 2. Watch/Listen to lectures 1-13.**
- 3. Write a three page essay describing the inspiration, inerrancy, and authority of Scripture as well as the relationship of each one of these issues to one another. Footnote all citations and include a bibliography**
- 4. Write a four page essay describing your position on the nature of continuing revelation (i.e., prophecy, tongues, words of knowledge). In particular explain whether you believe prophecy is a present gift in today's church. Explain the relationship between your understanding of the gift of prophecy and the sufficiency of Scripture. Compare and contrast views other than your own. Footnote all citations and include a bibliography.**
- 5. Write a three page essay defining natural revelation and special revelation and describe their authority and the manner in which they relate. Footnote all citations and include a bibliography.**
